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## The Beaver and Lake Erie Canal

In this day of rapid transit, of railroads with frequent and dependable schedules, and of automobiles moving over modern roads through all parts of the country, and air lines covering the world, it is difficult for us to appreciate the conditions that existed and the difficulties to be overcome in providing the early means of transportation between the seaboard and the Western Country.

The first means of travel was by foot and by horse following well defined routes established by the buffalo and the Indian. This was succeeded by the turnpike and after that we find the search for a better means of transportation leading the early settlers to the construction of canals. The first canals were comparatively short and connected important centers along the Eastern seaboard, such as the canal from Boston to Lowell completed in 1810. New York undertook the construction of the Erie Canal in 1817 and completed it eight years later in 1825. Its success was immediate and it affected a revolution in internal trade. In ten years it repaid its entire cost of construction and at once made New York the dominant seaport. The cost of transportation per ton from Buffalo to New York, formerly \$100, promptly dropped to less than \$25.

It is interesting to recall that George Washington early turned his attention to this means of transportation. Shortly after the Revolution he made a trip through the Mohawk Valley in New York State to see if a canal could be constructed to connect the Hudson River and the Great Lakes. In September and October 1784 he made a trip up the Potomac River and down the Youghiogeny River via the Monongahela and the Cheat Rivers and back east via the south branch of the Potomac, looking for a canal route to connect with the Ohio River and still not enter the estate of Pennsylvania. On his return from this trip he advocated the legislatures of the states of Virginia and Maryland the chartering of a company to be called the Potomac Company to

build a canal along the Potomac River from Washington to Cumberland, Maryland. Both assemblies approved and each state subscribed to fifty shares of stock, Washington who had subscribed Ten Thousand Dollars was elected president. After directly the affairs of the company for four years, he refused re-election and soon thereafter he was elected President of the United States. Some years later the canal was completed to Cumberland.

The rivalry between the seaboard cities was intense and each undertook to promote a means of transportation to the West. As early as 1811 the first steam boat was launched on the Ohio so that the real problem was to connect the East with the Ohio Valley.


Pennsylvania and the city of Philadelphia early joined in the race, and in October 1834, the first canal boat reached Pittsburgh from the east. Previous to this many other canal projects within the state were proposed and started.

During the summer of 1824 surveys were made for a canal from the Ohio River to Lake Erie. In August of that year General Barnard, Colonel Totten, Major Douglass, and Captain Poussin, United States Engineers, examined a route via the Allegheny River and French Creek. General Barnard and Captain Poussin had been officers in the Army of Napoleon. Following this was a better contest between those favoring the Allegheny River route as opposed to those who advocated the so-called Western route via the Beaver and Shenango Rivers and Conneaut Creek.

The legislature settled the matter in 1827 by passing an act providing for a canal from the Ohio River near Rochester, Pennsylvania, to the city of Erie, running via the Beaver and Shenango Rivers and Conneaut Lake, and several sections were put under construction during that year.

The canal started at the mouth of the Beaver River and the route followed the Beaver to the mouth of the Shenango below New Castle, thence via the east bank of the Shenango through New Castle, Pulaski, Middlesex, Sharon, Sharpsville, Clarksville, Shenango and Greenville, entering the borough just opposite the Bessemer Roundhouse. The Bessemer Freight House and Passenger Station are built on the old canal location. The canal crossed Main Street at about the same place the Bessemer Railroad does at this time, and was carried over the Little Shenango near the Bessemer Bridge in a timber flume and preceded up the Little Shenango to Osgood. Thence up Crooked Creek through Adamsville, Hartstown, Shermansville to Meadville Junction where it met the French Creek feeder.

The summit level extended from Meadville Junction to north of Harmonsburg Station. The canal then followed Conneaut Creek Valley on the route now occupied by the Bessemer Railroad as far as Albion. From here it left Conneaut Creek and dropped rapidly to Girard, crossing the Elk Creek Valley almost one hundred feet above the bed of the stream 2 ½ miles south of Girard. From Girard it turned northeast, parallel to the lake, to Erie, entering the bay near the foot of State Street.

It was decided to use Conneaut Lake as a reservoir to supply water to the summit level of the canal whose elevation on its highest reach was 1,085 feet above tide water. The surface of Conneaut Lake being 1,072, it was necessary to build an embankment at its southern end thus raising the lake a sufficient amount to discharge into the canal. In order to secure enough water, it was necessary to divert water from French Creek through a feeder to Conneaut Lake. A dam known as Bemistown Dam was constructed in French

Creek two miles north of Meadville and a canal was designed to extend from this dam through Meadville, then to Shaws about seven miles from Meadville where it was to cross French Creek, being carried over the creek in a timber aqueduct. From here the canal followed the north side of the Conneaut Lake outlet, through Watsons Run, Conneaut Lake Town and discharged into the lake which is stated above had been raised some twelve feet above its natural level.

Samuel P. Bates vividly describes the commencement of work on this part of the project.

“It was a joyous day for Crawford County when it became assured that the canal was to be a reality, and the breaking of ground as it was celebrated at Meadville was an event of a lifetime. The line of march was formed at the Diamond. The formation was announced by the booming of a cannon and the clanging of bells. The procession was led by Captain Torbett’s company of artillery, Captain Berlin’s company of light infantry and a band of music, followed by a long array to teams, laborers, and civilians. Arrived at the point of operations, which was in front of the residence of James white, on the terrace, the exercises were opened by prayer offered by the Rev. Timothy Alden, President of Allegheny College, who delivered an address, which was followed by the event of the day, ‘the breaking ground’. This was assigned to two aged pioneers, Robert Fitz Randolph, nearly ninety years old, and Cornelius Van Horn who was eighty. The plow was drawn by seven pair of oxen, and when the earth had been loosened, eight laborers with their wheel barrows appeared and removed a portion of the earth. The artillery was brought into play and delivered thirteen rounds which echoed along all the hills. Reforming, the procession moved to Lord’s spring, where a cold collation was served and, in accordance with the custom of the times, the head of a barrel of fine old whiskey was staved and the tin cups were merrily passed. Returning to the Diamond, the procession broke ranks, and the work of building the canal was fairly inaugurated.”

The feeder was completed to Conneaut Lake in 1834 but work on the main canal proceeded very slowly. In May 1832, a meeting was held at Mercer attended by delegates from Beaver, Butler, Mercer, Venango, Crawford and Erie counties to urge the completion of the canal and in 1834 Governor Wolf refers in his message to the Legislature to the urgent appeals made by the people of northwestern Pennsylvania for the completion of the canal.

During the administration of Governor Ritner, 1835 to 1839, appropriations for the canal were made and in 1842 Governor Porter informed the legislature that the canal was completed from Rochester on the Ohio to Greenville, a distance of 72 ¼ miles, and in 1843 Governor Porter reported the canal completed to Conneaut Lake, a distance of 98 miles.

Requests to the Legislature of 1843 for further appropriations to finish the canal from Conneaut Lake to Erie raised the question as to the whole canal situation. It was pointed out that the state had at this time \$41,900,000 invested in canals and many saw that the railroad was rapidly showing its superiority as a means of transportation. As of January 1, 1843, the state had built 793 ¼ miles of canals and had 140 miles under construction. They had spent \$4,000,000 on the Erie Extension and it was estimated that it would take \$211,000 to complete it.

As a result of the opposition to further appropriations the assembly passed an Act, incorporating the Erie Extension Canal Company, turning over to them the work completed and in progress without cost of condition that the company complete the work. This company was headed by Rufus S. Reed of Erie, as president and principal stock holder. The proposal to turn the canal over to a private company met with great opposition. The three canal commissioners at Harrisburg in their report of 1843 were very bitter in their comment and they saw in this a move on the part of New York to get control of the Erie Extension in order to reduce rates to the Ohio Valley and thus take away most of the business of the main Pennsylvania Canal from Philadelphia to Pittsburgh. The work was pushed to completion and on December 5, 1844, the first boat entered Erie. It was the Rufus S. Reed loaded with coal shipped from the farm of William Fruit of Clarksville, Pennsylvania. The cargo weighed fifty tons. The total length of the canal from Rochester to Erie was 136 miles. There were 85 locks between Rochester and the summit level and the same number between the summit and Erie, a total of 170 locks.

As a general thing there were no works of any great magnitude on the canal. The principal difficulties met and overcome were as follows:

A sufficient water supply on the summit level was accomplished by raising Conneaut Lake some twelve feet and is diverting a supply of water from French Creek to Conneaut Lake, a distance of some twenty miles. In order to increase the flow from the lake to the summit level, pumps were placed near Lynces Junction although it was only necessary to operate them in dry weather.

At Harronsburg the summit level passed through a cut some twelve to fifteen feet deep for a distance of a mile, and a great deal of trouble was met with here, due to the presence of quicksand.

All of the excavation on the canal was done with teams, plows, wheelbarrows, picks and shovels, and the waste banks along the sides of the canal to this day bear mute testimony of the battle fought and won at this place. A considerable portion of the cut was floored and the sides partially lined with large timber.

From Springboro to north of Albion the canal was level, a distance of some ten miles and then the country falls off very rapidly to the plain along Lake Erie. At Lockport they placed twenty-eight locks in a distance of two miles, the average for each lock being six and one half feet.

At Elk Creek near Girard and at Walnut Creek near Swanville, large aqueducts were necessary to carry the canal across these ravines. In each case the structure was almost one hundred feet high and was built of timber. The Elk Creek Aqueduct cost \$28,000. The first structure lasted until 1858, fourteen years, when it was necessary to rebuild it and it is interesting to note here that the second aqueduct lasted thirteen years.

The canal after its completion did a very heavy business considering the times and the country through which it ran. Coal, lumber and food products moved north and iron ore from Michigan and Lake Superior moved south. Hundreds of immigrants landing at Montreal and New York came to Buffalo then by packet to Erie and then via the canal to Pittsburgh to later take the Ohio River boats to the west.

With the opening of the canal from Rochester to Erie the Reed Line put into service passenger packets fitted up with berths, served meals, etc. These packets were scheduled to make the trip between Rochester and Erie in thirty-six hours, and a boat left Rochester and Erie daily. The fare was four dollars, including berth and meals. To secure speed the boats were drawn by three horses, the horses being changed about every ten miles. The crew consisted of a captain, two steersmen, two boatmen, a lock lifter, and chamber maid, a steward, a cook and helper. This made a crew of ten persons. In addition to this one man drove the horses.

Although the freight boats had no accommodations for passengers, they frequently carried large groups of immigrants who furnished their own bedding and food for the trip. The freight boats were expected to make the trip Rochester to Erie in forty-eight hours.

The following letter written 1842 vividly describes a voyage from Greenville to Pittsburgh at that time:

“To Milton Leech, Postmaster at Leeches Corner, June 1, 1842:

Half past 2 went on board the *Ontario*, at Greenville on old bote of D. Leeches Commanded by Capt. Joseph Dumers arrived at Clarksville at 8 staid all nite I lodged with Isaac Halzen. The canal from Greenville to Clarksville is in fine order, the locks are finished in the best order, the one at the lower end of slackwater a round big bend I think the best I ever seen, said to be built by Lusk.

June 2 — Sun an hour high, left Clarksville the bote is convenient and good accommodations but its loaded with lumber say about 6000 feet which crowds it some — 8 o'clock at Sharon, is a handsome place has a butiful harbour or bason sufficient for 2 or 3 hundred botes but cant become a place of much note except for its cole trade for this they appear to be going into largely, building wharfs for sliding cole into the bote the cole is of good quality — half past 9 leaving Sharon, 12 hour stop this is traveling two slow — Gen'l Curtis has a platform on which he delivers 120 tone of cole weekly which is taken to different ironworks — 25' past 11 past Middlesex rather a poor village but in a fine country — Canall in excellent order for travel — (Slow going) — 1 o'clock enter Polesky it is quite a piert looking place some good buildings on Main Street road from Wilmington to New Bedford a good Bridge over Creek — seen old Billy Byars he is very frail — near my age — six o'clock enter Newcastle to stay all night — I am tired of this slow travel — N. Castel is an interesting place — Just now the steam bote arrived — 12 hours travel on 7 mils Slackwater above N. C.

June 3 — 5 o'clock M. left N. C. — Thos Wilson Esq. on board on his way to Harrisburg — 6 o'clock at Brakefast 22 mils below N. C. at the Aequeduct of the O. crosscut — (raining) 2 o'clock enter Beaver but must stay til 8 tomorrow, at the mouth of Beaver it is called Bridgetown it is all alive since I stopt 4 steamers past down and 2 stopt.

June 4 — After 5 & very fien up, all sleep too long, at 8 we go aboard the *Cleveland* for Pittsburgh My health is very good I get along very well and would enjoy myself well if traveling faster, I

hope to make more speed when on a steamer — 1 o'clock in Pittsburgh, cant get abote to start til Monday — at \$5 — caben pesage & borded — Judge Wick is here on his way home — Got money changed.

John Leech Pittsburgh, June 4<sup>th</sup>, 1842

In passing it may be emphasized that a great drawback to the canal was that on account of freezing over it was closed during the winter months, usually from November to April. During the year 1860 the tolls amounted to \$104,336 and the cost of upkeep was \$70,379.

In 1864 the New Castle and Erie Railroad now the E & P Division of the Pennsylvania was completed, the first train reaching Erie October 31. Inasmuch as this railroad practically paralleled the canal it cut into the canal business to such an extent that the canal traffic rapidly declined and the public interest in same waned. One reason for the rapid decline of the canal traffic was that the railroad and canal were both controlled by the Reeds and their first concern was the railroad. In fairness, however, it must be recognized that a better means of transportation was available in the railroad and the canal had to bow to the inevitable.

The canal continued to receive business until the fall of the Elk Creek Viaduct September 5, 1871. This accident is described in the *Greenville Argus* of September 13, 1871 as follows:

On Tuesday night of last week the aqueduct across Elk Creek near Girard fell with a tremendous crash. By this calamity navigation on the north end of the Erie Canal is effectually closed, at least for a long time, and it is very doubtful whether it will ever again be resumed. To repair the aqueduct will require the expenditure of a large amount of money, and it is a question whether the business now transacted over it will justify the outlay. There is some hope, however, that it may be repaired.

And the same story is told in the *Erie Observer* of September 7. 1871.

### Goodbye Old Canal

About eleven o'clock on Tuesday night the aqueduct by which the canal crosses Elk Creek gave way and fell into the valley below, leaving nothing of the structure except a short projection at each end.

Boats had been crossing without trouble up to within a few minutes of the accident, and although the aqueduct was considerably out of order it was not thought to be unsafe. The ravine at this point is both deep and wide and the expense of restoring the aqueduct would be very large. Navigation is suspended and many loaded boats are stretched along the canal, on the owners and workers of which this blow will fall heavily. It is not probable that the boats can resume running this season, and we doubt whether the canal will ever again be operated.

This mournful prediction proved to be correct and this accident marked the closing event in the history of what had been the means of developing the counties bordering the Ohio state line north of the Ohio River. For a period of twenty years, 1844 to 1864, it provided the only means of good transportation to northwestern Pennsylvania, and during this period it was one of the important highways of travel serving not only the local communities through which it passed, but playing an important part in the development of the western country.

Too little honor has been done to the memory of those hardy pioneers whose labors were soon forgotten when the highway they had built was succeeded by a more efficient means of travel.

### Artemus on the Draft.

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# Pennsylvania Soldiers in the Hammond General Hospital September 1863

Captain L.C. Edwards arrived at Point Lookout [Maryland] on July 9, 1862 to begin arrangements for a hospital. At first, the hotel and cabins were used for the many injured and sick soldiers sent to the point. Only a few improvements were needed on the property. Outbuildings were constructed for a kitchen and other support services. Operations were going very smoothly at the point, but soon it became clear that more space would be needed. The army decided to build a new hospital complex. On August 4, 1862, the contract was written for the construction.<sup>2</sup>

The new hospital was built as a set of sixteen buildings arranged in a circle like the spokes of a wheel with four smaller buildings in the middle. The buildings were connected by a large round roof. There was space for a kitchen, a chapel, a library, storage space, and the headquarters for the doctors who worked in the hospital. As many as 1,400 wounded soldiers could be treated in the hospital at one time. There was also a 20,000 gallon water tank built in the center of the circle of buildings. This tank could be used to flood the buildings in case of fire.

The hospital, completed in the spring of 1863, was known as Hammond General Hospital and was probably named after the Surgeon General of the

United States, W.A. Hammond. The hospital was staffed by both military and civilian doctors and nurses. The Sisters of Charity worked in the kitchen and wards.

The hospital was first used for Union soldiers who were sick or wounded in battle. Hammond Hospital operated throughout the Civil War. Both Union and Confederate soldiers were treated there. It was officially closed on August 18, 1865.

There was even a newspaper published at the hospital called the *Hammond Gazette*. It reported local news, new arrivals to the hospital, visitors, and deaths. The following list of Pennsylvanians in the hospital was taken from the edition of September 22<sup>nd</sup>, 1863.<sup>3</sup>

## McBride Family Papers

Samuel McBride (listed as S. McBride), was one of the Pennsylvanians in the hospital on that date. Either he or some family member saved this edition of the *Hammond Gazette* and it is included in the papers at the History Center.

According to the finding aid for the McBride Family Papers, Samuel McBride was born and raised in Washington County, Pa. He served as a private in Company G, 140<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania Regiment. This unit was composed of companies from Washington, Greene, Mercer, and Beaver Counties. He suffered a head wound on May 5, 1863 while serving on picket duty at Chancellorsville. After spending time in a field hospital, he was sent to Hammond Hospital at Point Lookout, St. Mary's County, Maryland.

The collection also includes Samuel's Civil War diary.

**M**icrofilm of *The Presbyterian Banner*, 1871-1898, is available in the Pennsylvania Department of the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh. Death notices in the newspaper represent individuals from a wide geographic area, including eastern Ohio and West Virginia. The newspaper was published under this name from 1860 to 1898.

The newspaper contains death notices and some lengthy obituaries. All genealogically significant information was abstracted, although there may be additional information in the original article that would be of interest to the family. The edition of the newspaper is given at the end of each entry.

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## The Act of Union 1800 Pennsylvanians in British News Articles

The Act of Union in 1800 combined the parliaments of England and Ireland, essentially abolishing the Irish legislature. The Loyal National Repeal Association of Ireland was formed by Daniel O’Connell in 1840 to repeal the Act, and re-establish the Irish parliament, which would allow the people of Ireland the right to be a nation once again. Large public meetings, called “monster meetings,” were held throughout Ireland in the early 1840s. The following articles were found at the website of the Gale Group, 19<sup>th</sup> Century British Library newspapers. [*This is a subscription database.*]

*Freeman’s Journal and Daily Commercial Advertiser*, Dublin, Ireland,  
November 16, 1841

Under the headline “Loyal National Repeal Association of Ireland”, was an article including a letter from Patrick McKenna, President of the Repeal Association of Pittsburgh, dated Oct. 10<sup>th</sup>, 1841. The sum of one hundred pounds sterling was donated to the Ireland Association. The following were listed as Repeal Volunteers: Patrick McKenna, President, a native of Tydavnet, County Monaghan; Rev. Edward F. Garland, county Monaghan; Charles Shaler, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, US; John Downey, Dunbell, county Kilkenny; William Porter, county Donegal; Michael O’Beirne, county Roscommon; Edward D. Glazzan, Pittsburgh, Penna, US; Wilson M’Candless, Pittsburgh, Penna, US; Andrew Burke, county Cork; H. Dunne, Granard, county Longford; James Landon, Pittsburgh, Pa, US; John T. Connelly, Ashfield, Galway; Luke Taafe, Athleague, county Roscommon; Henry M’Cullough, county Derry; William O’Neill, Glen of Aberlow, county Tipperary; Hugh Heenan, county Monaghan; John Birthingam [sic], John Andoe, Dublin city; John F. Kelly, Pittsburgh, Penna, US; John Anderson, Bushmills, county Antrim; Samuel Keller, Bucks County, Penna, US. The Lord Mayor of Dublin, Daniel O’Connell, observed that this was the first time that the Repeal movement in America was extended beyond the Aleghany [sic] mountains.

*Freeman's Journal and Daily Commercial Advertiser*, Dublin, Ireland, Apr. 22, 1842

This headline reads "Celebration of St. Patrick's Day in America — Repeal" "St. Patrick's Day in Pittsburgh" (From the *Pittsburgh Advertiser* of March 25)

"The Repeal Association of this city celebrated the late anniversary of St. Patrick's Day by a public supper at the Washington Hotel, on the 17<sup>th</sup> inst. Between two and three hundred persons sat down to supper." President of the association was Patrick McKenna, Esq. Other members of the Committee of Invitation included Mr. Gazzam, H. Toner, J. T. Connelly, and M. Tracy.

A related article was found in the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh newspaper collection in the *American Manufacturer*, Pittsburgh, PA, Saturday, March 20, 1841.

Entitled "St. Patrick's Day", the article described "an immense assembly of Irishmen and others at the Washington Hotel." This article did not name the organization holding the meeting, but did list the following officers: P. M'Kenna, Esq., president; W. Porter, Thos. Dickson, Foster Graham, M. M'Cullough, Thomas Hamilton, and Jas. Callan, Esq's., vice presidents; M. M'Sharry, Andrew Burke, M. Kane, and Wm. M'Ellroy, Esq's, Secretaries. "Volunteer" toasts were given by these supporters: M. M'Cullough, Thos Hamilton, Thos. Dickson, James Callan, Michael McSharry, W. M'Ellroy, Michael O'Hanlon, Kennedy Lonergan, Daniel Sherran, Wm. Farrel?, John McGuire, Michael Tracy, James Lonergan, Patrick Walsh, Thomas Kerr, A. H. Black, Thomas Flood, Hugh Poland, Hugh Duffy, John Gray, James \_\_\_\_\_, John M'Ginis/McGinn?, Maj.
