

Mercer Academy

The first Mercer Academy was chartered in 1811 with a stipulation that poor children be taught *gratis*. In 1838 it started receiving a \$2000 grant from the Commonwealth. The Academy was a college preparatory institution. The curriculum included languages, higher mathematics, chemistry, botany, mineralogy, natural philosophy, logic, moral and intellectual science, geography, grammar, music, etc.

A report published in 1820 lists as trustees

Every institution has its share of notable graduates. Mercer Academy was no exception. Rev. Joseph Ruggles Wilson was the father of President Woodrow Wilson. Another graduate, James Bingham, was elected to the U. S. House of Representatives from Ohio. Following the Civil War he prosecuted Mary Surratt for her role in the Lincoln assassination.

Mercer Academy served as the community's principal secondary education institution until about 1850. Part of the reason for its demise may have been the withdrawal of State appropriations in the 1840s. This had been the final straw in the struggle for survival of similar institutions. The building subsequently burned.

Mercer Academy and School of Music

This second institutional incarnation was in the form of Mercer Academy and School of Music.

The Academy was started in 1901 when its building was erected on a site formerly occupied by the local school district. The three-story brick structure had recitation rooms, a chapel, a library, a laboratory, the business department, a gymnasium and an auditorium seating 400. Following a 1907 courthouse fire the facilities were shared with the County government. The Academy functioned for about ten years. The building was subsequently used as a warehouse and was sold for \$2650 at a sheriff's sale in 1924.

Courses of study were the classics, science, music and business. In line with its aim of being a preparatory school, the curriculum included Latin, Greek, French, German, mathematics, science, history, and grammar. The Academy also provided an extracurricular program which included fielding football and basketball teams.

The only Catalogs available are for the 1905-06 and 1908-09 academic years. From the 1905-06 Catalog we learn that

“The aim of Mercer Academy and School of Music is to furnish young men and young women with educational advantages of the highest type. Within its province it has in view the thorough and symmetrical development of all the powers of the mind and of the body.”

The school, however, was distinctively preparatory, and the management was disposed to keep within the limits which such a consideration of necessity prescribes.

1905-06

Reminiscing

My folks came to Coraopolis in 1907 and in 1908 bought the house in which I was born and live. Dad's medical office was in a building facing Ferree Street where the Speedy Mart now stands. This office was in the building recently occupied by Charlie Roll's Record Publishing Company. They lived with Jack Jorden's grandparents, the John F. Schmidts at 1611 State Avenue until Martha Cooper Zimmerly (grandmother of Dr. John Maratta and great-grandmother of Dr. Jan Maratta) found out that Mary Jane (Molly) Eaton's boy was living with strangers. Made no difference to her that she was as much a stranger as the Schmidts; they had to move in with her in her home across from the Lincoln School at 1615 Ridge Avenue.

Some of my companions in the very early days were Sam Dugan who lived at 1521 4th Avenue, Sam Neely who also lived in the 1500 block on 4th, and Bill Bryson who lived in the 1500 block on 5th Avenue. One game we played was rolling hoops from Bryson's in the middle of 1500 block—river side of the street to Ferree Street, down Ferree to 4th—down river on 4th and then up Montour to 5th and back to the middle of the block. We also raced wagons over the same path. Another close friend was Howard Tibbals who lived behind me at 1623 Ridge Avenue. John Coffin's mother taught us music at Lincoln School, but died early on, and John lived with his aunt, Alice Phillips (Mrs. Ferd) at the northeast corner of 5th and Ferree. Duane Snyder lived at 415 Barn Street and the Doyles lived at 407 Barn. Mr. and Mrs. Doyle were lovely folks and could have well been used as pictures of honest Irish folk. Their sons had confusing names—Florian was known as Mutzie; Cornelius was Coozie, and I don't recall what Sputzie's given name was. Sputzie was drowned at age twelve in Montour Creek where it went under the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie railroad tracks. Anna Doyle had long red hair and was in my class in grade school. The Santuccis also lived on Barn Street, if I'm not mistaken. One son's name was Guerino which we promptly anglicized to Greeno.

In those days, Fifth Avenue was unfinished and only extended the one block past Shimer's house was at the top of Barn Street. It was one excellent place to play ball, but we had to be careful. Old Louie lived in the house that had been Dad's office and he had a wonderful garden at the southwest corner of Ferree and Fifth Avenue. If someone got lucky and had a good hit and the ball landed in Louie's garden, the guy playing left field had to hop the fence, grab the ball, and then jump the fence into the back yard of the Englehart Apartments at 1530 Fifth Avenue. Louie would come bolting out of his house, sickle in hand. Don't think he'd have ever done anything with that sickle, but one never wanted to give him a chance to use it. It was nice, having Aunt Alice handy as she usually quelled all arguments before fists flew.

When we were children, it was always, "Yes, ma'am," or "No, ma'am," or "Thank you very much." Any older folks who were close friends of the family were "Aunt" or "Uncle." Charlie Graham lived at 1608 State Avenue. His dad was president of Graham Nut and Bolt. The lot between his house and mine was a sunken valley that was always impassible during wet seasons and we'd have to go back and forth by the street or the alley. These lots were a part of the farm of George Ferree who had lived at 1822 State Avenue. His daughter, "Aunt" Side Ferree said that the farm had had a spring there in her youth. "Aunt" Jenny Byers bought the property in 1915-16 and built the bungalow that Don Smith lives in now. Charlie Graham and I were always playing there and getting in the road of the McKown and Beattie builders and when they were pouring the cement foundation one of the colored workers grabbed one of us and threatened to entomb us in the concrete saying that would guarantee the building owner a long and happy life. From then on, we didn't play in the building while the workers were around, I can promise you.

In line with the "Aunt and Uncle" bit, Blanche Zimmerly who became Mrs. William Maratta and was Dr. Jan Marietta's grandmother was always "Aunt" Beebee; Sarah Ferree was "Aunt Sade"; her sister, Mrs. Thomas Edward Cornelius was "Aunt" Jennie and Mrs. Sanford Ferree was "Aunt" Phoebe. Sanford was "Uncle" Sanford. He was the first dead person Charlie Graham and I ever saw. Wilson's lived at 1620 State Avenue, but I have no idea why they were never Aunt Adah and Uncle John. Ferdinand Mummelthey and wife and daughter lived at 1630 State and there was quite a large apple orchard between Wilson's and Mummelthey's in which we were free to play. Mr. Mummelthey was superintendent at Graham Nut and Bolt. His daughter's name was Georgette and she was a lovely redhead. I don't know why the Mummeltheys never attained aunt and uncle status, but that didn't prevent Charlie Graham and I from including them in on our begging routine.

Wilsons always had sugar cookies, Mummeltheys had Hershey bars, and I don't remember what Aunt Phoebe Ferree had. Aunt Phoebe was Sanford's second wife. She had been a school teacher and she hailed from Enon Valley, Pennsylvania, where my mother had grown up.

As we grew up and were able to crawl under the coal cars always on the Montour railroad tracks, we played baseball and football at what we called the Power House field. It was called that because there was a large power house to supply electricity for the street car line that ran from Pittsburgh to Sewickley. Incidentally, there was also another power substation along Narrows Run Road where the valley cuts down from Moon Township and a stream (anyone know the name?) ran under the street car line and the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie tracks. In my early years, the Neville Island bridge was a toll bridge and it cost one penny to walk across it. Mr. Braun was the toll taker. Where 4th Avenue now hits the bridge coming from the east, there used to be a park for extra street cars. We used to drive Mr. Braun nuts by sneaking in and ringing the bells. I notice that Mr. Braun was living, in 1927, at 1616 Vance Avenue and he was listed at that date as bridge custodian. His daughter, Rosella, married Harry Elder. Phil Braun (no relation) was listed as rotary operator at the Power House and much as Aunt Alice Phillips had done earlier, prevented bloodshed in our games.

The Passavants were lovely people. Don't remember the mother's name, but father was Phillip and he was an engineer on the Montour where his son James was a fireman. Wilma became a nurse, I think. At any rate, they had a camp on the south shore of Neville Island below the bridge. Jack Jorden and I and a few friends were allowed to use the two canoes they had in mornings and afternoons, but we had to have them clean by evening for Ira and Jim and their dates. It was wonderful. In those days, we had the dam at the lower end of Neville Island and another at Glen Osborne. The depth of the water was controlled by wickets. A wicket was a 2 x 12 piece of oak timber. I don't know how long they were. To get the water deep enough for steamer, they would raise the wickets and the water would back up behind them. The McCullochs were employees of the Department of Engineering and the father was in charge of that dam, if I'm not mistaken. There was an island in the back channel across from Montour Junction station in those days and when the wickets were down and the water in the river was low, you could wade from Montour Junction Station to Passavant's camp, if you didn't mind being in mud up to your knees! Jack Jorden and I got an "in" at the camp through the friendship of Jack's mother, Grace Schmidt Jorden, and her sister and brother, Emma and John Schmidt.

In winter, other sports opened. Fathers and older brothers would maintain traffic control at State and 5th Avenue and there was a fire at Fifth. You could start sledding on the sidewalk where Vine Street hit Montour and with a good crisp snow, ride down Montour almost to Neville Island Bridge. It was great sport and depending on how daring your girlfriend was, it was a wonderful way to spend a snowy evening. You'd go bellying gliders and your sweetie would kneel between your legs and away you'd go. When the water was low and the river froze, you could skate on the river. I have been told you could skate all the way to Pittsburgh! Then, too, you was always seeing fish in some ponds so someone had to run home and get an axe and you'd pound and pound and pound, but I never remember anyone getting one. There was once quite an ice storm and the streets became skating rinks and we had a wonderful hockey game on State Avenue. The rink extended from Ferree Street to George Street. George Bubb was the only one with shoe skates; the rest of us had clamp-ons. Crushed Pet Milk cans were our pucks. Pet Milk cans were always wonderful toys for playing 'Duck on the Rock.' Then when you stamped on a Pet can properly, it would clamp on your heel and you became an instant horse. Karo cans had clamp-on lids and so you punched a small hole in the lid, put one of two bits of carbide and a little water in the can, put our foot on the cam to hold it still and touch a match to the hole— instant cannon. They still sell an actual cannon made on this principle.

During World War I, we kids learned about trench warfare and so, with Uncle Will Maratt's permission, a trench was dug in his garden. We even had a furnace in it made from someone's discarded stove. The canon was a piece of stovepipe with a plunger fed by rubber from an old inner tube. (You young folks will have to get your parents to tell you what an inner tube was!) War games were conducted in the apple orchard between Wilson's house and Mummelthey's. Dad was off at war and so the paper bandages he had bought were used in repairing damaged soldiers. It was during World War I that we learned that when you were shot, you didn't have to die! This led to most war games ending in arguments over who had been killed when shot and who had only been wounded. I had a wonderful Daisy Air Rifle modeled on a military rifle that actually had a rubber-tipped bayonet. This tip was conveniently lost at the earliest moment.

Franklin Neely's folks had the first four-wheel brake car I can remember. It was a Richenbacker. Our first 4-wheel brake car was a four passenger Buick two-door couple. The front passenger seat was a jump seat that folded down when not in use. These four-wheel brakes were mechanical brakes and the brake rods connecting front and rear brakes would freeze up and you might have to get out and give the rods a whack to get everything working again.

While I was in college, Dad had a Buick country club coupe. It had a small door behind the passenger door so your golf clubs could be stored under the seat. It also had a rumble seat in case more than three people were to be passengers. Of course, it was nice to have three people in the front seat, because then you could accidentally feel your date's knee while reaching for the gear shift. And that reminds me of my first car when I started to practice medicine. Mother gave me her Model A Ford and the gear level on it could be pulled up lightly and rotated so you girlfriend could move closer to you more easily. That's what all we sports thought anyhow, although actually it was a convenient way to get more room if you were riding with four people. In those days it was not unusual on a multiple date night to ride ten people in a five-passenger car. Three girls sat on fellow's laps in the back seat, another girl sat on a boy's lap in the passenger side of the front seat and the driver's date sat in the middle of the front seat. Goodness by how your legs would get numb if the ride was a very long one! And that leads me to other cars. The brother-in-law of one of my friends owned a Reo and the gear-shifting arrangement was opposite to other cars. This frequently led to a little gear clashing when it became your turn to get out of the back seat and do the driving. In Model T Fords, it was unusual to have to turn around and back up a hill if your gas tank was low in fuel. The gasoline ran from the tank, which was under the front seat, to the engine by gravity and, if the fuel level was low and the hill was steep, there was no way it could flow up hill.

Getting back to the games at Power House Field. In those days, there was no deep knowledge in our group of racial slurs. In one of your playmates had arrived in the U.S. from the province of Bohemia I what was then the Austrian Empire, he was, in stressful events, such as dropping a pop fly, a 'butter-fingered Bohunk.' If from the Hungarian portion of the Empire, he would be dignified by the term, "clumsy Hunky." Our Italian friends, in the stressful moments, were "Dagos." You can guess what we called Ernest Maribels, our African-American pal. It must be remembered that these terms were used while under great stress in sports—never, never, never during the course of a serious argument. In line with these remarks, there were only two African-Americans in my graduating class from Cory High—Parker Key, who later worked in our local post office, and Ida Bowman. Earlier, was had had two other girls, Bedetta and Iola Ashville. Their father had graduated from CHS much earlier, but I do not remember just when. Iola became the mother of Dale Lee. Incidentally, the only pal of German extraction I can remember with a nickname was Howard "Dutch" Germrodt.

W. F. Englehart owned the house at 1601 State Avenue. Later his widow owned the store building at 1537-39-41 State Avenues, as well as the

apartment building at 1530 Fifth Avenue. At one time, Marcus Steinfield had his meat market in 1537 State Avenue; William Lantz had a grocery store at 1539, and Frederick Harmon ran the hardware store owned by Lantz at 1541 State. By 1921-22, Ed Brock was in the meat market. My mother, and many other mother's shopping tour, began at the meat market, progressed through the swing door into Lantz's grocery store, and finally through the rear passageway into the hardware store where, on the left, was a stand of free yellow yardsticks. Don't know about the other mothers, but mine brought hers home, taped the handle of three of them together, and used them to leave the imprint of my long black stockings on the calves of my legs and the memory of the misdeed for which they were imprinted for at least the better part of a week! A disastrous fire in Lantz's store led Lantz to move further down State Avenue and Walter (Pete) Maginnis put his drugstore in the 1539 location. Joe Conroy later took over that drugstore The Bassett Brothers, John and Lionel, had the grocery store at 1541 State for many years. It was wonderful for the neighborhood as they always did a thorough cleaning job on Sundays and so, if you were graced with sudden company, you could always sneak in for extra food. Mr. Steinfield left Coraopolis and went back to Beaver Falls for a short time but later had a meat market in the building across the street from Dr. Berlin's office. While I was in my later years in high school, I would always stop to make sure mother had not called an order in that morning.

With all the nattering, I find that I have failed to bring up the subject of education. Having been born in March of 1909, I did not start school until the fall of 1915 at Lincoln School. Miss Harriet Barnes was my first grade teacher, Miss Campbell taught second grade, Alice McKinley had third grade, and Mabel Platt had 4th grade in those days. I do not remember who had fifth grade as there was an upheaval in the education process and a great many students were skipped a grade. Ernie Hofacker, Isadore Rankin and I all skipped over fifth grade. I tutored in math with Florence Mercer that summer and went to sixth grade under Rachel McKallip. Rachel maintained order by the use of a rattan switch or for less offenses, one spent time in the cloak room. One bright and sunny day, Lisle Weaver, Rachel's nephew and I ended up at the opposite end of the cloak room, bored out of our skulls. He held up an aggie and spread his legs; putting it in the V they formed. I slowly retrieved my marble bag and started rolling. If I hit it, I kept his shooter; when I missed, he kept my marbles. Almost all shooters were called aggies because many were actually turned from agate. The ball bearings some of us used as shooters were called steelies. Suddenly a bomb exploded in my head from a resounding slap along my right ear administered by Lisle's dear aunt

Rachel. That was nothing compared to the tune she played on our legs with her rattan switch.

There was no prom, in the sense most of you know it, in those days. It was known as the Junior prom and the Junior Class entertained the Senior Class—or that may have been vice versa. There certainly was no dancing. Now it just so happened that a group of older fellows, graduates from the Class of 1915, etc., had a club known as the Dorset Club, and they had erected a small building, still standing, at the head of Maple Street, where Hiland Avenue joins Maple on the right. You could rent the services of Wad Kevan as pianist and his lovely wife, Liz Leigh, would act as chaperone. At other times, Bill Miller would play and his girlfriend, Jo Dailey, would chaperone. One of their daughters is married to our chief of police. The night of our prom, a group of us rented the Dorset Club, and after the prom was over in the high school at 11 pm, we repaired to the club and dance until 1 am or so. Our parents knew all about this and thought nothing of it. However, the four or five or six renters of the club were called in to the Myers B. Horner's office (Principle of the High School) the next Monday morning and, if memory serves me right, were threatened with expulsion for dancing at a school function! As soon as we reached our homes and relayed our news, the school phone began to ring off the hook and the authorities were told that the school function had ended at 11 pm and what we did after that was between us and our parents. I do not remember hearing anything more about the matter.

My mother's father must have delighted in annoying her. On my fifth birthday he drove up to our home with a load of lumber—he was a lumberman—and a Shetland pony. At that time, we had a huge barn behind our home that still had some hay, straw, and feed in the upper reaches. He quickly built a box stall for the pony. "Jimmy" kissed mother and me and went whisking back to Enon Valley. This is the same gentleman who gifted me with a 22 caliber rifle for Christmas of 1919! I never did get around to asking my mother which of the incidents aggravated her more. Of course, my Dad set up a target range in our cellar and taught me how to load and use the rifle. The back stop was a metal plate which came from I know not where. To the right of the target backstop were the wash tubs and, of course, that is where the copper wash boiler hung—the bottom towards the target. You can well imagine the excitement on the following wash day, which was always on Monday, when that boiler was filled with water and started to leak through the small holes the fragmented bullets had caused!

Until fairly recently there existed, in the back channel of the Ohio River between Groveton and Neville Island, a rather large island known as Sunshine Island. In the late teens and early twenties, several groups of young men from Coraopolis maintained quite elaborate camps there during the summer months. An early group named their camp DI-CU-CHE-HA, as the members were Everett Dickson, Basilile Curry, Harry and Frank Chesney, Herbert Hahn, and Frank Harper. Later they sold their camp to the Dorset Club, three members of which were James Dolph Start, Norval Neison, and Floyd Morse. Norval Neison was known throughout his life as "Rake." He had an electric repair shop in the borough and during his camp days, had a small gasoline engine in his canoe. He was the envy of all of us who had to paddle our canoes. The Dorset Club built the building which is now the last house on the right hand side of Maple Street where it joins Hiland Avenue and it could be rented for \$5 per night for dances while I was in High School. There were several other clubs on the island from time to time or even concurrently. One was the OCTO Club because it had eight members—Ed Bubb, Ray Ridgeway, Myron Hafer, Byron Hafer, Stewart Cupps, Wallace Hood, Alf Verner and ?. There was also a Bachelor Club, but I never had a list of members.

Dr. Frank Robert Braden, Jr. was born 27 March 1909. He graduated from the University of Pennsylvania, School of Medicine, in 1933 and practiced in partnership with his father. Their office was located in the family home in Coraopolis and between the father and son, they served the community for 100 years. Doc Braden retired in 2009 and turned 105 years old this year.

The Images of America book, *Coraopolis (PA)*, is dedicated to him for his century of service to the community, as well as his contributions to the book. Doc is a World War II veteran, who served from 1941-1946 in a medical regiment, an infantry battalion, a tank destroyer battalion, an engineer combat and the combat command reserve of the Eighth Armored Division.
