

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The Rise and Fall of the State Bank of McKeesport

In 1925 a group of people in McKeesport, Pennsylvania, composed mainly of Slovak, Rusyn, and Hungarian immigrants, decided to invest in a bank. Shares of stock were issued for a total investment of \$50,000. By 1930 the bank had debts of over twice that amount. The bank lasted five years, but the court case involving its losses stretched into the 1940s. The lower court ruled that the shareholders did not have to reimburse the state for the debt, but the decision was reversed on appeal. Each shareholder was ordered to pay an amount equal to his initial investment, plus interest and court costs. Depositors got only three-fifths of their money back after 15 years.

In 1925 a group of people in McKeesport decided to invest in a small bank. The investors were chiefly Eastern European immigrants or their children—Slovaks, Rusyns, and Hungarians. Why did they decide to make such an investment? Perhaps they wanted more control over loans and mortgages, a place to exchange foreign currency, or a convenient means to send money back to family in the old country. The investors included businessmen and ordinary steelworkers, as well as local branches of several fraternal benefit societies.

The bank originated in 1919¹ as a privately held business called the American Foreign Exchange Bank. They had a listing in the McKeesport City Directory of 1920.² See figure 1. The bank incorporated on 13 Feb 1925 under the state Banking Act of 1876.³ The name changed to the State Bank of

McKeesport, but many of the same people held office. (Figs. 1, 2) They had a listing and advertisements in the McKeesport City Directory, for example Figures 2 from the McKeesport City Directory of 1929.⁴

One thousand shares of common stock were sold at \$50 each to raise \$50,000. There were 122 investors. The officers and investors are listed in table 1, below and table 2, appendix A. The bank closed five years later at the end of 1930, but the court case against the investors ran on into the 1940s. A timeline of events is given in table 3. See appendix B.

My grandfather, Andrew Nasta, was one of these investors. Andrew was born in 1877 near the town of Varanno in Austria-Hungary. Today that town is in eastern Slovakia and is called Vranov nad Topľou, meaning ‘Vranov on the Topla River.’ Grandfather left Varanno for McKeesport in 1897.⁵ He married Annie Kovac in 1902 at the Holy Trinity Slovak Catholic Church on 7th Street.⁶ They bought a house in McKeesport near the East End Grade School (8th Ward) where they raised nine children.⁷ On 6 February 1926 my grandfather bought five shares of capital stock in the State Bank of McKeesport at \$50 each for a total of \$250. See figure 3. Little did he realize the problems that were to come from that purchase.

The State Bank of McKeesport, 416 Locust Street, was located in a storefront office inside the Hotel Dandar. The hotel, 418 Locust Street, was at the corner of Locust and Jerome (now Lysle Boulevard). See figure 5. The Hotel Dandar, built in 1921, was a traveling man’s hotel. They were proud to say that every room had a bath, hot and cold water, and steam heat. It featured a



restaurant, a barbershop and a billiard room, as well as the bank.⁸ George Dandar not only owned the hotel, he was president of the bank. He bought 108 shares, the most of any investor. See appendix A. In the Census of 1930 George Dandar was listed as an immigrant of Rusyn nationality from Czechoslovakia. His occupation was hotel proprietor.⁹ The Chairman of the Board, Andrew Petach, was another Czechoslovak immigrant, but of Slovak nationality.¹⁰ His occupation was listed as secretary for the United Societies, an abbreviation for the much longer title of United Societies for the Greek Catholic Church in the United States, a fraternal benefit society. Andrew Petach owned 23 shares of stock in the bank. See appendix A.



Within five years debts overwhelmed the State Bank of McKeesport. It ceased operation on 31 December 1930. The front page of the *Daily News* for 2 January 1931 announced the consolidation of the State Bank of McKeesport with the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank of McKeesport.¹¹ Bank president Henry Friedman claimed the combined organization had assets of over \$2,000,000. It would do business at the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank location of 401-03 Jerome Street. George Dandar was given a seat on the Board of Directors.¹² Although the newspaper described the action as a ‘consolidation,’ the lawsuit stated this was an agreement approved by both sets of stockholders to liquidate the assets of the State Bank of McKeesport.¹³ Sadly, this second bank would also close in just over a year.¹⁴

The Pennsylvania Deposit Bank of McKeesport was the successor to the Joseph Roth & Son Bank, established in 1885, and incorporated as the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank on 27 February 1928.¹⁵ Andrew Petach knew the

staff there since he was employed by Roth & Son in 1917 when he filled out his draft card.

On 27 January 1932 the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank did not open its doors. Secretary of Banking William D. Gordon took possession of the business. The bank directors announced to the newspapers that the depositors would probably be paid in full.¹⁶ However, there was no insurance program to back up bank deposits. Depositors could be paid only as the assets of the bank were sold off and outstanding loans recovered.

Although the two banks had merged at the end of 1930, on 21 July 1932, Secretary Gordon took possession of the business and property of the State Bank of McKeesport as an independent unit, saying that this would assist in the settlement of the accounts.¹⁷ After that, the court cases against the shareholders were handled separately. On that same day, the bank's liabilities were determined to be \$112,014.89.¹⁸ This was more than twice the \$50,000 raised by the sale of stock. According to an article in the *Daily News* on 23 July 1932, the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank had net available assets of \$653,483.37 against net liabilities of \$1,148,188.07.¹⁹

Depositors got a first payment of 10% in August of 1932. There was a second payment of 5% on 31 March 1933. Checks of a dollar or more were mailed. Checks of less than a dollar were distributed in the banking rooms on Jerome Street.²⁰ In early 1934 the bank received a loan of \$368,000 from the Federal Deposit Liquidation Corporation and the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC). According to the *Daily News* of 14 February 1934, another payment to depositors was expected soon.²¹ The third payment of 15% was finally made on 24 August 1934. A letter from Banking Secretary Gordon accompanied the check. The letter explained recovery policies.

“Although we have been operating during a period of unprecedented economic conditions, we have been able to liquidate forty-one percent (41%) of loans, eighty-five

percent (85%) of securities, and twenty percent (20%) of mortgages, and with a total gain in conversion of \$26,905.24. It is worthy of notice that this liquidation has been conducted economically for depositors for, during the period ended March 31, 1934, the net cost was less than three cents per dollar collected, and the cost to each depositor was less than one and three-tenths cents for each dollar of his deposit, or six-tenths of one cent per deposit dollar per annum.”

“These results have been possible only because of the orderly and businesslike plan of liquidation followed. Ruthless dumping of assets has been avoided. Amortization of loans has been permitted for worthy debtors. There have been no relentless foreclosures with a further destruction of real estate values of home owners and for going banks, as well as those in possession of the Secretary. The same careful policy has been pursued with respect to securities.”

Luther A. Harr succeeded William Gordon as banking secretary. In October of 1935 a story appeared in the Daily News saying that the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank was negotiating a second loan from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC). They hoped to pay depositors a fourth disbursement of 10%. Secretary Harr said the delays in paying depositors “were caused by necessity of clearing title to certain properties, to obtain RFC loans, in preparing accounts for courts, in obtaining approval for settlement of realty sales, and in general to the difficulty of liquidating remaining assets of the banks.”²² The banking secretaries began to look for additional ways to raise funds to pay depositors.

In 1938 George Dandar had another set of problems. He ran into trouble with the State Liquor Control Board (LCB) for selling drinks on Sundays. At a revocation hearing Dandar testified that he didn’t sell alcohol, but “sometimes gave away drinks to his friends on Sundays.” LCB agents testified that they had not made purchases directly from Dandar but one time he was behind the bar when they were served. Dandar was anxious to avoid losing his liquor license; the 64-room hotel represented a \$125,000

investment. He was told “drinks on Sunday are prohibited whether free or sold.”²³

Irland McK. Beckman succeeded Luther Harr as banking secretary. On 26 August 1938 Secretary Beckman determined that the assets were insufficient to pay the creditors in full. At that time the liabilities of the State Bank of McKeesport were determined to be \$102,917.16 as a loan payable to the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank of McKeesport. Assets were just \$6,258.90.²⁴

The Secretary for Banking decided to enforce the individual liability of the stockholders for an amount equal to the par value of the shares of stock owned so that an additional part of the debt would be repaid. Registered letters containing a written notice of assessment and demand for payment were sent to the last known address.²⁵ This meant that grandfather owed the commonwealth \$250 for the five shares he purchased in 1926. Payment was due 26 September 1938. Seven of the 122 shareholders paid all or part of their assessment so that the commonwealth collected \$875 out of the \$50,000 total assessment.²⁶ The other shareholders claimed they were not liable for the debts of the bank and hired legal assistance. The case centered on the provisions of the Banking Act of 1933 with respect to the older Banking Act of 1876 and how these laws applied to banks that had been incorporated and which had closed prior to the passage of the 1933 law.

R. W. Doty succeeded Irland Beckman as banking secretary. John C. Bell, Jr. then succeeded R. W. Doty. On 9 April 1940 Secretary Bell appointed L. H. Humbert to be deputy receiver.²⁷

In July of 1941 the Court of Common Pleas of Allegheny County ruled in favor of the stockholders. The three judges who made the decision were Ralph H. Smith, John P. Egan, and Michael A. Musmanno. Judge Smith wrote the opinion, holding that “the assessment was made without legal authority,” citing a “definite conflict between two sections of the 1933 act, both of which apparently re-enact the liability provisions of the older law,

and another section of the 1933 law which 'definitely and absolutely' repeals the entire act of 1876."²⁸

On 1 October 1941 grandfather received a letter from William H. Coleman, Attorney-at-Law in Pittsburgh, informing him that the lower court had ruled in favor of the stockholders. It went on to warn that the state was appealing this ruling to the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. There were counsel fees of \$12.50. These were paid on 4 October 1941.²⁹ In November of 1941 the State Supreme Court reversed this decision in an opinion written by Justice Marion D. Patterson.³⁰ The case was ordered back to the lower court for further proceedings.

In December of 1941 the *Post-Gazette* reported that the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank had paid a fifth dividend to depositors, who now had 50.5% of their money.³¹

Grandmother Annie (Kovac) Nasta died on 13 November 1942.³²

In November of 1943 the *Pittsburgh Press* reported that the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank had paid a sixth dividend to depositors. The disbursements now reached 55.5%.³³

In 1944 the banking secretary was William C. Freeman. In January of that year he filed additional lawsuits against the stockholders of the Pennsylvania Deposit Bank of McKeesport.³⁴ The *Daily News* again reported that depositors had been paid only 55.5% of their deposits.

On 5 October 1945, grandfather received a letter from Deputy Receiver L. H. Humbert advising him that the legality of the assessment against the

shareholders had been definitely determined.³⁵ The assessment resulting from #267 July Term 1941 had grown to \$349.20 plus additional interest of \$9.50 plus court costs of \$16.20. The \$349.20 probably included the original assessment of \$250.00 plus interest accruing from the first deadline for payment of 26 September 1938.³⁶ Payment was demanded by 20 October 1945.

This was a substantial amount at a time when the annual wage for an ordinary steelworker was perhaps \$2,000. Family oral history suggests that grandfather was able to pay the debt only with the assistance of his daughter Elizabeth, not yet married and still living at home. In 1945 he worked at the Firth Sterling Steel Company in McKeesport. He retired the next year with the lawsuit finally behind him.

My parents had a small savings account at the State Bank of McKeesport. They withdrew most of their money before its closure as rumors about the bank started to spread. In June of 1946 they received a check for a penny (\$0.01) as their seventh and final payment of 5.8%.³⁷ Adding that seventh payment of 5.8% to the 55.5% returned as of the sixth payment in 1943 would bring the total recovery to depositors of 61.3% or roughly 61 cents on the dollar. My parents never cashed that check, but kept it as a souvenir of the Great Depression.

Much of the information in this article is taken from articles found in the Daily News (McKeesport, PA) and from privately held documents including the lawsuit filed by the Pennsylvania Secretary of Banking against the shareholders to recover losses and pay creditors. The documents will be donated to the McKeesport Regional History and Heritage Center
