Fredonia Institute apparently graduated its last class in 1916. The Trustees entered into a five year building lease (\$100 per year) with the local public school district. The lease was subsequently renewed on at least one occasion.

In addition to the Mercer County institutions already documented in this series there were other proprietary secondary schools that served their purpose, i.e., providing access to secondary education in the absence of tax supported secondary education. With the rise of public secondary education the need for these institutions ceased to exist and Darwin's "survival of the fittest" came into play. Other Mercer County schools of this ilk included but are not limited to Mercer Normal College, Sandy Lake Institute, Hall Institute, Jamestown Seminary and Sharon Baptist Academy.

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Views of Pittsburgh

The following excerpts on this page and on page 36 are taken from the compilation, "Pittsburgh as Seen by Early Travelers: Descriptions of Pittsburgh by those who visited it from 1783 to 1818," *Monthly Bulletin of the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh, April 1902-June 1906*.

Excerpt from the *Monthly Bulletin*, December 1903, p. 379—William Darby, *Emigrant's Guide to the Western and Southwestern States and Territories*, 1815.

Travellers are almost always disappointed on entering this city; there is but one point of approach that affords a good view of the place; that is the apex of the coal hill, in the road from Washington in Pennsylvania.

Perhaps of all the wonders of Pittsburg, the greatest is the glass factories. About twenty years have elapsed since the first glass-house was erected in that town, and at this moment every kind of glass, from a porter bottle or window pane, to the most elegant cut crystal glass, are now manufactured, at least, to the amount of 200,000 dollars annually.

Excerpt from the *Monthly Bulletin*, Oct 1904, p. 387—Timothy Flint, *Recollections of the last ten years* (Boston: n. p., 1826)

"The first thing that strikes a stranger from the Atlantic, arrived at the boat-landing, is the singular, whimsical, and amusing spectacle, of the varieties of water-craft, of all shapes and structures. There is the stately barge, of the size of a large Atlantic schooner, with its raised and outlandish looking deck.... Next there is the keel-boat, of a long, slender, and elegant form, and generally carrying from fifteen to thirty tones. This boat is formed to be easily propelled over shallow waters in the summer season, and in low stages of the water is still much used, and runs on waters not yet frequented by steam-boats. Next in order are the Kentucky flats, or in the vernacular phrase, "broad-horns," a species of ark, very nearly resembling a New England pig-stye.... Then there are what the people call "covered sled," or ferry-flats, and Allegany-skiffs. In another place are pirogues...hollowed sometimes from one prodigious tree. There are common skiffs, and other small craft, named, from the manner of making them, "dug-outs," and canoes hollowed from smaller trees."

Views of Pittsburgh

The following excerpts on this page are taken from the compilation, "Pittsburgh as Seen by Early Travelers: Descriptions of Pittsburgh by those who visited it from 1783 to 1818," *Monthly Bulletin of the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh*, April 1902-June 1906.

Excerpt from the *Monthly Bulletin*, May 1902, p. 157—Henry Bradshaw Fearon, *Sketches of America* (London: 1815).

"Passed through *M'Nair's Town*, a new log settlement; also *Eastern Liberty Town*, containing some brick-houses, an hotel, and a large steam grist-mill. At two o'clock we arrived at Hunter's hotel in *Pittsburgh*. The town was enveloped in smoke.

The published accounts of this city are so exaggerated and out of all reason, that strangers are usually disappointed on visiting it. This, however, was not my case. I have been in some measure tutored in American gasconade. When I am told that at a particular hotel there is *handsome* accommodation, I expect that they are one removed from bad; if *elegant* entertainment, I anticipate tolerable; if a person is a *clever* man, that he is not absolutely a fool; and if a manufactory is the *first in the world*, I expect, and have generally found, about six men and three boys employed.

Excerpt from the *Monthly Bulletin*, June, 1902, p. 194—Morris Birkbeck, *Notes on a Journey in American....* (London: 1818)

"Pittsburg is a cheap market for horses, generally rather more so than we found it; travelers from the east, of quit their horses here, and take the river for New Orleans, etc; and on the contrary, those from the west proceed eastward from this place, in stages. Thus, there are constantly a number of useful hackneys on sale. The mode of selling is by auction. The auctioneer rides the animal through the streets, proclaiming with a loud voice, the biddings that are made as he passes along, and when they reach the desired point or when nobody bids more, he closes the bargain.

A complete equipment is, in the first place, a pacing horse, a blanket under the saddle, another upon it, and a pair of saddle-bags, with great-coat and umbrella strapped behind.

Lower St. Clair

from the front page of the *Hilltop Record*, 23 October 1914

All that is left of Lower St. Clair Township, mother of boroughs and townships, may be found today behind Mt. Washington in Saw Mill Run Hollow, a mere remnant of one of the largest, richest and most important original townships of Allegheny County. Townships have been cut out of it, boroughs have been amputated from it, villages have multiplied and thriven upon its surface and have been absorbed by the great city, farms which were almost the largest and finest in the State have faded away into sub-divisions until they are now mostly thirty-foot town lots and enterprise and energy have transformed this forest township of the nineteenth century to a segment of the metropolis of the twentieth. St. Clair Township was one of the original townships of Allegheny County when it was organized in 1788 and its development was concurrent with that of that strip of land that lies in the great bend of the Monongahela river between Pittsburgh and Morgantown. Through this township the old Brownsville road was expanded from a sinuous bridle-path of more than a century ago into the highway of commerce over which so much of the valuable traffic between Pittsburgh and southeastern Pennsylvania passed for so many years. The Ormsbys, Hays and others of the oldest settlers were early and extensive holders of estates in this township, indeed their present possessions are matters of moment on the county assessor's books.

The integrity of St Clair Township was preserved until in the 'thirties when it was divided into Upper and Lower St. Clair townships. The records in the office of the county engineer do not disclose accurately the exact date of this partition, indeed the name of the particular year in which the dividing line was drawn, is a matter of conjecture. Another fortunate defect in the records of this office is the absence of maps of Allegheny County showing the

constituents of the county before 1850. Deeds and other papers give leads to their constituents but physical evidences are lacking, as is immediate information concerning important lines and facts about county conditions, even after the date named.

Baldwin Township was carved out of Mifflin, St. Clair and Jefferson Townships, February 24, 1844. This creation divested St. Clair of much of that land lying along Six Mile run and along the river west of the mouth of this stream to the city line, or rather to Brownstown, Ormsby, and the riverbank villages and boroughs of the middle portion of the last century. Snowden Township was cut out of a portion of Upper St. Clair Township in 1845. Chartiers Township was taken from Lower St. Clair Township by an act of the legislature in 1851. Kirkpatrick Township was carved from Chartiers in February 1861 and later, to be exact, Union Township supplanted Kirkpatrick in name and territory in September, 1881. Bethel Township came out of the area of Snowden and Upper St. Clair townships in June, 1886. Scott Township was taken bodily from Upper St. Clair in January, 1861. Other townships owe more or less of their territory to similar predatory raids by legislature or court, to the "mother of townships and boroughs" of which record is out of immediate availability. Ambitions, greed and devious policies, however, have left nothing by the shadow of a great name and a few paltry acres in an obscure valley, as a monument to a patronymic of honor and distinction in the annals of Allegheny County and to a territory that in extent and value might challenge the claims of many of the oldest duchies of Continental Europe.

Townships, however, are not all that have been taken from this old principality. Look at the list of boroughs: South Pittsburgh, March 3, 1848; East Birmingham, April 10, 1849; West Pittsburgh from Chartiers (formerly Lower St. Clair), February 19, 1853; Temperanceville (by the same route), October 29, 1859; Mt. Washington, April 12, 1866; Ormsby, September 2, 1868; Allentown became a borough March 1, 1870 and two years subsequently was taken into Pittsburgh; St. Clair was also a borough of October, 1870; West Liberty became a borough in 1876; Knoxville took on the "sunshine" in 1877; Beltzhoover was a borough in 1875; Greentree, in 1885; Esplen in 1891; Mt. Oliver, Elliot, Crafton, and Sheraden in 1892; Montooth in 1897; Ingram in 1902; Hays in 1901. All of these boroughs

came either from Lower St. Clair directly or from townships carved out of the old township. Many of them are merely traditions, having lost their identity by absorption by the Greater City and most of the remaining ones are toppling toward city-hall today. Allegheny County, in the very nature of things, yielding to the genius of development and following the trend of progress must, before the present century consumes a tithe of the years owing to it, become a great, compact, densely populated city, cosmopolitan in its citizenship and metropolitan in all of its characteristics of commerce, banking, manufactures, schemes of development, plans of philanthropy, methods of education and sanitation, St. Clair is not "lost, strayed or stolen." It was a big township and produced big things from Chartiers creek to Six Mile run when it extended, as originally constituted, from the Washington county line to the Monongahela River. In its time it became nucleitic of the present development of the South Side and of most of the South Hills.

Dr. Samuel Hamilton, Superintendent of the Allegheny County schools, in advance sheets of his annual report, discovered the apparent loss from the county map of this great township and after sufficient search found the remnant living along Saw Mill Run. His comments on his discovery have in them the elements of a primitive epitaph: Hear him:

"In the craze to form new districts the county has literally lost a township somewhere in the suburban wilds of Pittsburgh. Section after section was taken from Lower St. Clair Township until it was left in two separate and detached parts. One part was incorporated as St. Clair borough, and the township bearing that name disappeared from the county map. But the other part lost or strayed, but not stolen, has at last been found. It has no name, no legal identity, no voting precinct, no school nor school organization, and presumably no school tax. In this no-man's-land, however, there are a dozen or 20 children who are residents of the county and yet are without school rights. It is logical to assume that no-man's-land is Lower St. Clair Township, since all of that township was not absorbed by or annexed to other districts, and legal steps should be taken to have the lost township annexed to some school district that the State may furnish these children the school rights guaranteed to them by the Constitution."

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
