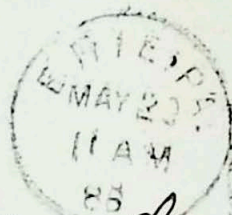

Dear Brother

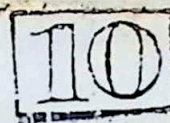
I rec^d a letter last Wednesday from you dated 7th Feb^y which gave sad intelligence indeed but still there was hope as long as life lasted to say Adaline & Myself wrote an answer to it in hopes ^{that} our beloved Sister Janeas would still be able to hear its contents I took it to the Post Office this evening & there found a letter from Hervey which caused me not to send until I should know the contents which its outward appearance to plainly told I went immediately out to Father's the scene that appeared there I am not to describe but you will readily imagine Mother wished me to write a few lines to you immediately your trial has certainly been great would that we could have been with you little did we think last Feb^y that we would be called so soon to mourn the loss of another sister but mysterious are the workings of Providence this way past finding out it is a great consolation to us that ^{your} inestimable Friend & Kinsman J. L. Gray was with you in that trying hour & also that our departed Sister had the bright prospects of a happy exchange it seems to be another loud call to us all be ye also ready — — — we ought to be willing to submit to the will of Providence knowing that our loss is her everlasting gain

Father & Mother are both in rather delicate health
this winter altho no particular disease but the infir-
mities of age they are still about but frail
the rest of us are as well as usual Richard is
just getting over the Measles William & family are
well Aunt Boyd is better but still confined
to the house the rest of the Friends also at Erie
are well Maj Gray has been troubled with Rheum-
-atic pains but is better — Friend J. L. Gray

dear Mrs Boyd I was glad

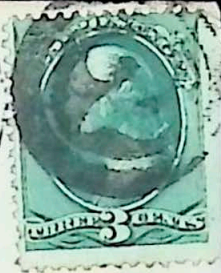
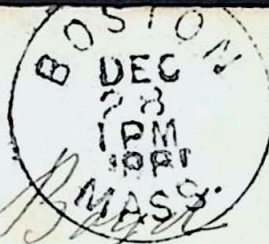
to see your hand write I knew

Dear Brother

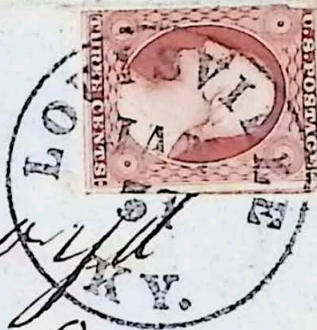
I am last kind favour of Jan

I suppose I will not hear from you again till
after the February Court. I hope they will get
out if not all of that business closed up, if
you can spare the time I wish you would
attend the two my dear friends Sanford and Snacy
and help them through as far as possible.
I have not heard from B. Walley yet so I
will write them with the tools you have on
hand and let me know the result.
Mrs King left here 3 weeks ago for Enid
but is yet in Cincinnati sick. I have left
here this morning to see her - we sent
some hamenys with her to Eteline and
Percy if she gets there they will get it.
we have had a very open winter no ice yet
and very little cold weather. The Queen
took a high high about Christmas - and like
all others that gets high spent its capital and
left things along I have in an ugly fix -
Edmund McHaffey was in last week. They are
all well out there. but not doing much in the
mail business the mill he says does well -

I unate the the other said in a hurry
intending to let mings mail it in
Sincinnatti. but he was off before I got
Down. but uncle Sam will take it -
we are all well and Dairys as well
as we know have - and as we are hope
ful Children. we still hope to do bet
ter. Regiah says tell Nancy and Sarah that
she is waiting impatiently for that
letter that they are cooking for her
Henry said they had it skinned and in
the Pot when he last wrote -
Produce of all kind is Plenty here and
cheap Butter from 12½ to 16 cts Pork 6 cts pound
4, 10 a barrel Potatoes 25 to 30 cts a bushel.

give us all the news - give our love

Dear Sir If I did not give a Bill for the following stuff when you were here I wish you would be care full and not send any Log. Longer than 12 foot into any other kind of Lumber for me -

Poplar 1 1/8 inch Boards - not less than 15 inches wide and up to 30 inches wide or as wide as can be got - 14 or 16 foot Long Square Edged Clear stuff - Stated -

I have a bill to fill of that kind of stuff - will you inform me how much of it you can get by the first of July next - all other kinds of Lumber not over 12 foot Long -

P.S. My object in putting the above stuff 1 1/8 inch thick is to have it - Very Plump 1 inch thick when seasoned
