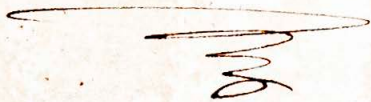

Your letter dated yesterday learns our business just where it was when I wrote to you. by reference to my letter you will discover that I propose that our disagreeing about the Contract for the work done upon your out houses shall remain unsettled for the present leaving each of us to take our own course as to that matter hereafter — and that I was now willing and ready and demanded to be allowed to comply with my Contract as to the work upon your dwelling house — seeing that I have a large quantity of work ready prepared to put up in that house and that my interest is suffering by your refusal to permit me to do it. I hope you will yet see the propriety of this course and write me saying you will make no opposition to my doing so —

this side of Christmas, I dislike to move into a house

do it, I can have it made in 3 days I wish to be
friendly with you but cannot consent to be ^{put} made
off any longer; the death of my wife is bad; she is at this
time confined you know that I have been indulgent
to you. —
